G1. Provide direction on phased improvements for public plaza in closed portion of Santa Cruz Avenue along the 600 block (Staff Report #25-175-CC)

Assistant City Manager Stephen Stolte made the presentation (Attachment).

The City Council received clarification on replacement of immediate needs, providing input on design, visual design continuity throughout Santa Cruz Avenue and event planning and entertainment space.

The City Council discussed public outreach and accessibility considerations, meeting the needs of all community members, repurposing and color palettes, vehicle traffic, storage at the plaza, movable items and overnight security, maintenance of services, games, playground structure and dog park options and quiet seating.

The City Council directed staff to replace picnic tables with steel/modern furniture, including picnic style tables (model 537), small tables and chairs (models 485-30 and 483), flexible benches (model 530) and to install a variety of furniture options for testing by the public.

G2. Provide additional direction on Home Upgrade Services program enhancements to ensure expenditure of the first half of the communitywide electrification project grant funds (Staff Report #25-176-CC)

Sustainability Manager Rachael Londer made the presentation (Attachment).

Charles Chapa commented on the Belle Haven Community Campus (BHCC) as a great energy

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model.

Larry Moody spoke in support of the recommendations.

The City Council received clarification on eligibility lists, history of program location eligibility and repercussions of missing March 2026 deadline.

The City Council discussed expanding citywide, allowing staff to regulate where funds are expended within the grant project categories, Belle Haven referral bonus program, e-bikes, timeline for implementation of recommendations, air quality in Belle Haven neighborhood, and the original intent and current state of the program.

The City Council directed staff to explore all recommendations and proceed with those that can be accomplished.

- June 23, 2020, a portion of the Terminal Avenue public right-of-way was vacated
- City acquired land adjacent to the Terminal Avenue right-of-way from PG&E
- An additional 4,689 square foot portion of the Terminal Avenue right-of-way was planned to be abandoned and integrated into the BHCC site to created one unified parcel





LOCATION MAP








NEXT STEPS

Community feedback – outreach events



High level summary of feedback at events

Define zones with planters and benches for activities and sensory-friendly uses

Create flexible gathering areas and a mix of seating

Install shade sails, umbrellas, and string lights for both day/night use

Design engaging, modern spaces using murals and art appealing to all ages

Project phases



- Phase 1 3 months
 - Install temporary ADA ramp
 - Order and install site furnishings
 - Refine design concept
 - Launch call for public art proposals
- Phase 2 3-6 months
 - Larger projects including lighting, public art, landscaping, stage

- Phase 3 TBD
 - Mid-block crosswalk

Site furnishings



- Install multiple fixed and movable options in the short term and gather feedback as design is finalized
- Recommendation to install combination of stationary tables/benches and movable tables/chairs
- Furniture to review includes:
 - Tables with attached or fixed seating
 - Large benches
 - Individual chairs and small tables
 - High seating to define edges





Home Upgrade Services program enhancements

Funding background



- State grant of \$4.5 million to be expended by December 2027 on communitywide electrification
- First half of funds (\$2.25 million) to be expended by March 2026
- Feb. 2023: Agreement with Peninsula Clean Energy (PCE) to electrify homes in Belle Haven through its Home Upgrade Services program



Home Upgrade Services program background



- No-cost installation of the following measures for eligible residents
 - Must live in a Belle Haven home of 1-4 units, household and/or homeowner at or below 120% of area median income, PCE customer, electrifying at least one major appliance
- March 2025: Initiated first round of program enhancements
 - Offering solar and battery systems
 - Providing ~20 rental electrification bundles
 - Expanding to rental homes and to households at or below 120% of area median income
 - Electrifying Belle Haven Child Development Center

Electrify your home for free - no hidden costs. While funds last. Act today.

The City of Menlo Park is working with Peninsula Clean Energy to provide new appliances, electric panel upgrades, and more to improve your family's health and comfort at home.

This program is available to income-eligible Menlo Park homeowners in Belle Haven. All are encouraged to apply to verify eligibility.



Recommendation



City Council to provide additional direction on Home Upgrade Services program enhancements:

- expanding the program citywide
- offering matching rebates
- increasing budget for solar and battery and rental electrification bundles
- partnering with additional community based organizations
- creating a referral bonus,
- ensure expenditure of the first half of the communitywide electrification project grant funds by March 31, 2026
