Presentation: Realize Flood Park update – San Mateo County

Parks

Recommendation

City staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Commission review a presentation by San Mateo County Parks about a proposed redesign of Flood Park (Attachment A.)

Policy Issues

As an advisory body to the City Council, the PRC makes recommendations and serves as a forum for public input, commentary, and discussion related to recreation programs and facilities in Menlo Park.

Background

Flood Park is owned and operated by San Mateo County Parks. The park is located at 215 Bay Road within the city limits of Menlo Park, and offers accessible picnic areas, paths, and restrooms, group picnic areas, and a large play structure. Unlike other County Parks, Flood Park has tennis courts, baseball and softball fields, and volleyball courts. Most of Flood Park's adobe buildings were built in the 1930s by the Work Progress Administration.

On April 27, 2022, the Parks and Recreation Commission received a presentation from San Mateo County Parks staff about the Realize Flood Park project.

Analysis

In 2015, an assessment of Flood Park revealed that many features and infrastructure required repair or replacement. Simultaneously, community demand grew for additional uses and sports fields at the park. In response, San Mateo County Parks launched Reimagine Flood Park, a multi-year in-depth community engagement process to identify community goals and priority uses for the park's redesign. The resulting concept plan, which reflected the hopes and desires of the public, went through environmental review in 2017 through 2019. In 2020, the County Board of Supervisors unanimously approved the Landscape Plan. In December 2022, the County Board of Supervisors approved the Phase 1 plan. San Mateo County Parks staff will provide a presentation containing updates about the project's progress and upcoming construction timeline.

Recommendation

City staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Commission and Library Commission jointly convene a public study session to review Menlo Park Community Campus proposed programming plan elements that have been developed over the past several months with robust community input, and in consultation with a working group of Belle Haven neighborhood residents and stakeholders convened by the Menlo Park Community Campus ad hoc subcommittee of the City Council (Attachment A).

Policy Issues

The Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) and Library Commission (LC) provide advice and recommendations to the City Council related to City programs and services such as those planned for the Menlo Park Community Campus (MPCC). City Council identified the MPCC as one of the City's top priorities.

Background

City Council created the Menlo Park Community Campus ad hoc subcommittee (MPCC Subcommittee) to work with City staff and the community on the MPCC project. The MPCC Subcommittee is currently comprised of Vice Mayor Taylor and City Councilmember Nash. The MPCC Subcommittee convened a working group of Menlo Park residents (MPCC working group) to support and advise the subcommittee's work.

A project webpage was created (Attachment B) to make project information readily accessible to the public, including the option to subscribe (Attachment C) to receive project updates and announcements by email or text message.

On April 12, 2022, the City Council reviewed an informational report containing preliminary operational planning milestones and existing City Council policy statements to help provide guidance for the prioritization and delivery of services in the MPCC (Attachment D).

On May 24, 2022, City Council reviewed an informational report containing a report from the MPCC Subcommittee and working group with initial programming ideas and recommendations, and a preliminary draft resident survey related to programs in the new center (Attachment E).

On June 22, 2022, the PRC and LC convened a joint study session to review operational planning for the MPCC and a report from the MPCC Subcommittee and working group with initial programming ideas and recommendations (Attachment F).

On September 13, 2022, City Council convened a study session to review MPCC project updates including the results of a resident survey to gain insight into residents' needs and interests related to recreation and community programming in the MPCC (Attachment G).

On September 28, 2022, the PRC reviewed MPCC project updates and the results of the resident recreation and community programs survey (Attachment H).

On January 25, 2023, the PRC and LC convened a joint study session to review MPCC programming considerations, including a presentation from the Youth Advisory Committee about potential makerspace programs (Attachment I).

On March 6, 2023, the LC reviewed Menlo Park Community Campus programming – library collections (Attachment J).

Analysis

Presentation - proposed programming plan elements

At the direction of City Council, Menlo Park Community Campus proposed programming plan elements have been developed over the past several months with robust community input, and in consultation with the MPCC Subcommittee and MPCC working group of Belle Haven neighborhood residents and stakeholders. Who the MPCC will serve

- Programs and services in the MPCC will reflect and prioritize the people for whom this facility is being created: Menlo Park residents, specifically Belle Haven neighborhood residents, and in particular, long time Belle Haven residents who relied heavily on the services in the previous center.
- The MPCC facility can and should serve these residents even more meaningfully, with even greater priority, and with even more responsiveness, inclusion, and belonging than existed in the previous center.



Guiding principles

The City of Menlo Park provides services and infrastructure that contribute to quality-of-life for all Menlo Park residents. In so doing, the City strives to balance the resources and requirements of each area of the city in an equitable manner for all residents, in all neighborhoods of the City. The City of Menlo Park prioritizes social justice in decisions that affect residents' lives:

- The fair, just and equitable management of all institutions serving the public directly or by contract;
- The fair, just and equitable distribution of public services and implementation of public policy;
- The commitment to promote inclusion, fairness, justice, and equity in the formation of public policy;
- Creating a healthy environment and nutritional options in City programs.



MPCC Subcommittee and working group

- City Council created the MPCC Subcommittee to work with City staff and the community on the MPCC project.
- Vice Mayor Taylor and City Councilmember Nash
- MPCC Subcommittee created a working group of Menlo Park residents to support and advise the subcommittee's work
- City staff have met with the MPCC Subcommittee and MPCC working group several times over the past several months.





Working group – general feedback







1. What neighborhood of Menlo Park do you live in now?




2. How long have you lived in Menlo Park?









Q6. For community programs and classes, how important are the following items?




Q12. How important are the following athletic programs?

Regular Business: Advisory body meeting format and attendance

requirements - AB 2449 Just cause and emergency

circumstances

Recommendation

City staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Commission receive and acknowledge understanding of this report related to state Assembly Bill 2449 (AB 2449) which changes advisory body meeting formats and attendance requirements (Attachment A).

Policy Issues

Advisory body attendance is governed by the rules of the Brown Act. The Brown Act requires a quorum of the body to be in attendance before a meeting can begin.

Background

The California Legislature temporarily modified the rules for advisory body meetings during the COVID-19 pandemic and the associate state of emergency. Governor Gavin Newsom terminated the state of emergency on February 28, 2023 (Attachment B). Beginning March 1, 2023, new rules were set in place by the State Legislature under Assembly Bill 2449. The bill requires a quorum of in person advisory body board members. AB 2449 makes some allowances for remote participation of advisory body members, but limits the number of and allowable reasons for, remote appearances.

Analysis

Beginning March 1, 2023, the procedure for participating in advisory body meetings will change per Assembly Bill 2449. As of March 1, 2023, all legislative body members (including City commissions) will need to participate in person unless one of the criteria outlined below is met. The public's remote participation under AB 2449 will not be impacted, and the City will continue hybrid teleconference meetings for the public as well as allow in-person attendance.

Under the first criteria for participating remotely, a commissioner can continue to apply rules from the traditional Brown Act.

The traditional Brown Act requirements (Gov. Code sec. 54953(b)(3)) (Attachment C) state that a quorum of the legislative body must be in-person at City Council Chambers, City Hall conference room, City library, etc. and any members participating remotely must post the address of where the remote legislative body member is participating from on the agenda for the meeting (i.e. home address, hotel, etc.). The agenda must also be posted on the door of where the remote legislative body member is participating from, in public view, and members of the public must be allowed into the location where the remote legislative body

member is participating from. For example, if a member is participating from home, then the public must be allowed access to participate in the meeting at the home.

Under AB 2449 (Attachment D), two new criteria for participating remotely have been added. They are referred to as "just cause" and "emergency circumstances."

"Just Cause"

To use "just cause," a commissioner must notify the legislative body at the earliest possible opportunity of their intention to participate remotely. This could include the notification being made up to the start of a regular meeting. The notification must be made by the member who is participating remotely and cannot be made by staff or the Chair on the remote attendee's behalf. The notification must include a general description of the just cause circumstances relating to their need to appear remotely at the given meeting. For example, "I am Commissioner Jane Smith participating remotely tonight for caregiving purposes."

Accepted reasons for using "just cause" are:

- Childcare or caregiving of a child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or domestic partner that requires a member to participate remotely
- A contagious illness that prevents a member from attending in person
- A need related to a physical or mental disability
- Travel while on business of the legislative body or another state or local agency.

In order to use "just cause," a quorum of the legislative body must still be in-person at the City Council Chambers, City Hall conference room, City library, etc.

"Emergency Circumstances"

To use "Emergency Circumstances," a member may request the legislative body to allow them to participate in the meeting remotely due to "emergency circumstances."

To do this, at the start of the meeting, the remote legislative body member must request that the legislative body allow them to participate remotely because of an emergency circumstance. The remote legislative body member then must provide a general description of the circumstances relating to the legislative body member's need to appear remotely. This description should be 20-words or less. The legislative body member does not have to disclose any personal medical information. However, the remote legislative body member must disclose whether any other people over 18 years old are present in the room and the general nature of the legislative body member's relationship with the individual

The legislative body must then vote to add the emergency circumstance to the agenda for consideration. A majority vote is required. If approved (e.g., add the consideration of an emergency circumstance to the agenda), the legislative body must vote to approve the remote legislative body member's participation. These steps are required before the commencement of the business meeting. The legislative body must then vote to approve the request. The legislative body must request a general description of the circumstances relating to their need to appear remotely at the given meeting.

Again, as with the first two criteria, an in-person quorum must be present.

Limitations on Teleconference Participation

AB 2449's teleconference procedures may not be used by a member of the legislative body to teleconference for a period of more than three consecutive months or 20% of the regular meetings within a calendar year, or more than two meetings if the legislative body meets fewer than 10 times per calendar year. Teleconference may not be used for more than two consecutive meetings. Members participating

remotely must do so through both audio and visual technology and must publicly disclose whether any individual over the age of 18 is present at the remote location with the member.

Under all circumstances listed above a remote legislative body member must participate through both visual and audio with cameras and mics engaged. Roll call voting will be required if one or more member is participating remotely.

Impact on City Resources

As an advisory body to the City Council, the Parks and Recreation Commission does not authorize resource allocations. City budget authorizations are the sole purview of the City Council. There is no substantive impact to the City's general fund related to the topics in this report.

Environmental Review

Meeting attendance of advisory board members is not a project within the meaning of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines §§ 15378 and 15061(b)(3) as it will not result in any direct or indirect physical change in the environment.

Public Notice

Public notification was achieved by posting the agenda, with the agenda items being listed, at least 72 hours prior to the meeting.

COMMISSION MEETING ATTENDANCE

New requirements – AB 2449





BACKGROUND

- Beginning March 1, 2023, the procedure for participating in meetings will change per AB 2449
- The City will continue teleconference meetings for all legislative bodies
- Teleconference = in-person and remote participation (hybrid)
- Legislative bodies = City Council, advisory bodies, commissions, committees, and standing subcommittees





NEW ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS

- All legislative body members will need to appear in person unless one of the following conditions is met
 - Traditional Brown Act requirements
 - AB 2449 "Just Cause"
 - AB 2449 "Emergency Circumstances"
- Public participation not impacted they may continue to attend and participate remotely



TRADITIONAL BROWN ACT REQUIREMENTS



- Quorum must be present in-person
- Address of remote participation site on agenda
- Agenda posted to the door of the remote location
- Members of the public must be allowed into the location where the remote participation is occurring
 - This requirement includes the home of the participating member





AB 2449 JUST CAUSE

- Quorum must be present in-person
- Can be used up to two meetings per calendar year
- Just Cause =
 - Childcare or caregiving of a child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or domestic partner that requires a member to participate remotely
 - A contagious illness that prevents a member from attending in person
 - A need related to a physical or mental disability
 - Travel while on business of the legislative body or another state or local agency





IN ORDER TO USE "JUST CAUSE"

- In-person quorum
- Notify your legislative body at the earliest possible opportunity of the need to participate remotely
 - The earliest possible opportunity can be, but is not required to be, at the start of the meeting
- Provide a general description of the circumstances related to one of the four items above (e.g., childcare, illness, disability, travel)





AB 2449 "EMERGENCY CIRCUMSTANCES"

- Can be used up to 20% of a legislative body's regular meetings per calendar year (January – December) and cannot exceed three consecutive meetings
 - If the regular meeting schedule is once a month: 20% = 2 meetings
- Physical or family medical emergency that prevents a legislative body member from attending in-person



IN ORDER TO USE EMERGENCY **CIRCUMSTANCES**



- At the start of the meeting, the remote legislative body member must request that the legislative body allow them to participate remotely because of an emergency circumstance
- Remote legislative body member must provide a general description of the circumstances relating to the legislative body member's need to appear remotely
- This description should be 20-words or less
- The legislative body member does not have to disclose any personal medical information



IN ORDER TO USE EMERGENCY CIRCUMSTANCES (2)



- Remote legislative body member must also disclose whether any other people over 18 years old are present in the room and the general nature of the legislative body member's relationship with the individual
- The legislative body must vote to add the emergency circumstance to the agenda for consideration
 - Majority vote required
- If approved (e.g., add the consideration of an emergency circumstance to the agenda), the legislative body must vote to approve the remote legislative body member's participation
- These steps are required before the commencement of the business meeting



ADDITIONAL RULES FOR REMOTE LEGISLATIVE BODY MEMBER ATTENDANCE



- Remote legislative body members must participate through both visual and audio
 - Cameras and mics engaged
- Rollcall voting required if one or more member is participating remotely
 - Robert's Rules of Order (45:48) requires that:
 - A verbal rollcall vote be done in alphabetical order, with the presiding officer (e.g., mayor or chair) last
 - Legislative body members can vote "yes", "no", "abstain", or "pass"
 - If "pass", following the remainder of the rollcall vote, the vote will return to that member

Recommendation

No decision or recommendation about specific building names will be made yet. The purpose of this informational report is to provide an update from the City Council about the Menlo Park Community Campus naming process and timeline.

Policy Issues

The Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) and Library Commission (LC) advise the City Council on matters related to City programs and facilities dedicated to recreation and libraries, respectively. As advisory bodies to the City Council, the PRC and LC make recommendations and serve as forums for public input, commentary, and discussion related to recreation and library programs in Menlo Park.

Background

On January 24, 2023, City Council directed staff to update City Council Procedure CC-86-0001, "Naming and/or changing the name of facilities" (Naming Policy) and undertake a process to identify:

- A name and/or dedication for the overall Menlo Park Community Campus (MPCC) building
- Names and/or dedications for each of the five major programs housed in the MPCC building
- Recognitions for individuals and/or groups who donate toward the costs of the opening day furnishings, equipment, books, public art, and other amenities in the MPCC building.

On February 22, 2023, the Parks and Recreation Commission held a public study session to hear input from the community and to inform the community and the PRC about the process and timeline City Council directed to identify a name for the MPCC project.

On March 14, 2023, City Council adopted a resolution updating the Naming Policy (Attachment A), and directed City staff to shift the entire timeline of the MPCC naming process to late summer 2023, to allow more time for City staff and the community to focus on developing the MPCC programming plan during spring 2023 (Attachment B).

Analysis

MPCC naming process and timeline

Per City Council direction, an updated timeline for the MPCC naming process follows. All dates are tentative and subject to change:

 July 26 – PRC and LC joint study session to consider input from the community, City Council direction and the Naming Policy

- July 26 PRC and LC reopen a 4-week public comment period for Menlo Park residents to provide input to for naming/dedicating the new facility and/or each of its five major programs
- July 26 to August 23 City staff conducts outreach in English and Spanish through multiple formats and collects and compiles input from community members
- August 23 PRC and Library Commission jointly convene a public meeting to consider community input and recommend to City Council:
 - Up to 3 potential names and/or dedications for the overall facility
 - Up to 3 potential names and/or dedications for each of the five major programs (community center, public library, senior center, youth center and aquatics center) that will be housed in it.
- September TBD City Council reviews the PRC's recommendations and community input, then selects:
 - The name and/or dedication for the overall facility
 - Names and/or dedications for each of the five major programs (community center, public library, senior center, youth center and aquatics center) that will be housed in it.

Public Notice

Public notification was achieved by posting the agenda, with the agenda items being listed, at least 72 hours prior to the meeting. In addition, the City sent electronic notices via social media and directly to project email and text update subscribers from the project page (Attachment C).

NAMING AND/OR CHANGING THE NAME OF FACILITIES

City Council Policy #CC-23-026 Adopted Resolution No. 6817



Purpose and scope

From time to time the City has the opportunity to name and/or dedicate a new facility, or the individual programs or components within a new facility, or is requested to rename and/or rededicate a previously designated park, playground, building or other unit under the City's jurisdiction.

In order to formalize the City's consideration of these opportunities and requests, and to provide guidelines to the public, the City has adopted the following procedure and criteria for the naming and/or dedication of facilities.

- 1. It shall be the policy of the City not to change the name of any existing City facility, particularly one whose name has City, regional or national significance, unless there are the most extraordinary circumstances of City, regional or national interest and no other new facility can so be designated.
- 2. The existing place names within Menlo Park shall be deemed to have historic significance to the City. The City will modify existing place names only with the greatest reluctance and, when naming or dedicating facilities in honor of a person or persons, only to commemorate a person or persons who have made major, overriding contributions to the City and whose distinctions are as yet under-recognized by the City.
- 3. The City Council is the final decision-making body for the selection of names and dedications for City facilities. The City Council may direct an appropriate City Commission to consider inputs from the community and recommend names or dedications to the City Council -- for example, it may select the Parks and Recreation Commission to do so for public parks, playgrounds, athletic fields, paths, tennis or pickleball courts, gardens, recreation buildings and related facilities.
- 4. The naming, dedication, renaming and/or rededication of City facilities will recognize and take into consideration the following criteria:
 - A clear and compelling connection to significant local places, communities, neighborhoods, history, geographical features, people, achievements, events, and/or other attributes of the City and community of Menlo Park
 - Inclusion, belonging, access, fairness, and justice for the entire Menlo Park community and all of the people who are part of it
 - A deceased person (no sooner than five years after death) who made major, overriding contributions to the City and community of Menlo Park and whose distinctions are as yet under-recognized by the City
 - National, regional or community groups that have made significant contributions to the Menlo Park community
 and have not been previously honored in a meaningful way by the City.
- 5. The City Council from time to time may authorize a dedication, memorial plaque, or other recognition in or on a facility that is closely identified with a person or group, or to recognize individuals and/or groups who have donated to the facility and/or individual programs or components within it, but the policy of the City is to retain the historic name of the facility.
- 6. For other than naming and/or dedicating a new facility and its individual programs or components, it is the policy of the City to take no action until at least six months from the receipt of a suggested renaming or rededication.
